Passage 1.1

Do not play your sound system loudly as you may not be able to hear warning sirens from emergency vehicles. In addition, hearing damage from loud noise is almost undetectable until it's too late.

Passage 1.3

In great contests each party claims to act in accordance with the will of God. Both may be, and one must be, wrong. God cannot be for and against the same thing at the same time.

Q5. For each proposition below, decide (8 marks):

- whether the reasons given meet the necessary conditions to support the conclusion. Write Yes or No and give reasons for your answer.
- whether the reasons given to support the conclusion are sufficient? Write Yes or No and give reasons for your answer.

Proposition

Example: birds have wings. The item has wings. Therefore, it is a bird. **Necessary?** Yes. Wings are a necessary condition for the item being a bird.

Yes. Wings are a necessary condition for the item being a bird. Sufficient?

No. The reasons given to support the argument that the item is a bird are not sufficient to satisfy the definition of a bird. This would include: usually flies, is animate, lays eggs, has two legs, had feathers. The information given is not sufficient to rule out an aeroplane or a toy.

Proposition 5.2

The priest arrived on a vehicle with two wheels, one in front of the other. The bishop must have been on a bicycle.

Passage 7.1

Einstein was not very good at maths when he was at school. Many school-children today could solve maths problems that he used to struggle with. The praise of "great scientist" shouldn't be given to someone who struggled with basic numerical problems.

Passage 7.2

More people should be informed of the value of studying maths to a higher level at school or university. A mathematical education can be very advantageous. Therefore, the guidance given to young people should emphasize the benefits of choosing maths.

Why pick on me, officer? Nobody comes to a complete stop at that stop sign.

Passage 8.3

Many of the women on the volleyball team are majoring in women's studies. So, it is possible that some of the women on the volleyball team consider themselves feminists.

Q9. Consider each of the following inductive generalizations. In each case, answer the question: Is the sample representative? Just write down Yes or No in your answer book. (3 marks)

Passage 9.1

Chicago, Los Angeles, and Houston are all big cities with big crime problems. So, all big cities must have big crime problems. Is the sample representative? Yes / No

Passage 9.2

All one hundred children who saw the latest Disney movie said it was great. So, chances are that nearly everyone who sees the movie will think it is great. Is the sample representative? Yes / No

Passage 9.3

Most Gratian students who watch the World Cup Final are unprepared for class the next day. So, most students who watch the World Cup Final are probably unprepared for class the next day. Is the sample representative? Yes / No

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
